As we close another impactful year at Veterans Bridge Home, I am filled with pride for all that we accomplished—together. In 2024, we continued to fulfill our mission to connect, lead, and advocate in communities across the Carolinas, ensuring that service members, veterans, and their families thrive.

Through your support, we connected more than 3,600 individuals to tailored resources, employment opportunities, mental health services, and critical social supports. We provided over 8,600 services, trained employers to better welcome veterans into their workforce, and expanded our wellness efforts to meet veterans where they are—especially in moments of greatest need. Every number represents a story: a veteran finding stability, a family finding hope, a community growing stronger.

This year, we didn't just respond to needs—we led. We empowered veterans to discover new opportunities, trained hundreds of employers to create veteran-ready workplaces, and advocated for systemic changes to better support the well-being of those who served. When disaster struck in Western North Carolina, we were there. When veterans reached out for support, we were ready.

And we're just getting started.

Looking ahead to 2025, Veterans Bridge Home is setting bold goals:


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

Hope & HEALING



One evening, I sat alone on my couch, accompanied only by my dog, feeling overwhelmed by depression. The weight of unpaid bills, unemployment, and an ongoing custody battle consumed my thoughts. Despite submitting countless job applications, including to fast-food restaurants, I received no responses. I was exhausted—mentally, emotionally, and financially—struggling to stay afloat. That night, I reached out to the VA crisis text line, hoping for some relief. However, the interaction felt impersonal, as if the responder was eager to end the conversation. I went to bed uncertain, just hoping to make it through another day.

The following day, I received a call from a VA social worker, followed by emails and phone calls from the Veterans Bridge Home SSG Fox Suicide Prevention team. At first, I was hesitant and skeptical. I had attempted therapy before, but it hadn't made a difference. However, I found myself connecting with William, my care navigator, in a way I hadn't experienced before. As a fellow veteran, he understood my struggles on a personal level, making our conversations feel less like formal appointments and more like checking in with a trusted friend.

William's unwavering support and encouragement pushed me forward. He celebrated my accomplishments—sometimes even more than I did, reminding me that I wasn't facing these challenges alone. While I still struggle with depression and anxiety daily, I have made meaningful progress. I secured two jobs and have maintained them for the past six months, working six to seven days a week. My financial situation is improving, and I expect to be back on track in the coming months. My divorce is progressing amicably and should be finalized soon.

Recently, I enrolled in college courses to pursue a new career path. Although I'm unsure how I will manage work, school, and life's demands, I've learned that perseverance is in my nature. This journey has reinforced my resilience. If I hit a roadblock, I'll adapt, pivot, and find a way forward—because giving up is not an option. The key is to keep moving and looking ahead. Obstacles are temporary and overcoming them is proof of strength.

Championing the rights and well-being of veterans and their families, driving systemic change and fostering support through advocacy efforts on the ground, across the state, and in the nation's capital.



Through powerful storytelling, we changed minds. Through policy engagement, we changed systems.

In 2024, advocacy wasn't an initiative—it was integrated into everything we did. From national media to state leadership, Veterans Bridge Home amplified the voices of those who served.

We brought key issues like mental health, suicide prevention, housing instability, and employment access to the forefront of public dialogue. Whether testifying at the state level, serving on North Carolina's Governor's Working Group, or traveling to Washington, D.C. to meet with policymakers—our team showed up.

We also hosted and co-led the Mission 85 Conference, a landmark event to build a unified support ecosystem for North Carolina's veterans, bridging gaps between military transition, civilian life, and community collaboration.



VBH remains committed to advocating for veterans at the national level, actively participating in key initiatives and collaborations. Our efforts include engagement with the VA VEO Veterans Resource Community Network and the IVMF National CoP & SSG Fox CoP.

We served on the advisory panel for Dr. Leslie Hausmann's "Evaluating the Impact of PAServes on Receipt of Veteran Benefits, VHA Healthcare Use, and Associated Costs."

Furthermore, VBH proudly co-chaired the VA & SAMHSA Governor's Challenge Innovations Conference representing NC, attended the VA & SAMHSA Governor's Challenge Suicide Mortality Innovations Conference, and participated in the VA VEO VRCN Conference, also representing NC.









Local Highlights

In addition to our national efforts, VBH actively champions veterans' needs through a variety of local initiatives, fostering direct community support and engagement including cochairing the NC Governors & Mayors Challenge and the NC Institute of Medicine Veterans Health Task Force. We also serve as a contractor for the UNC Gillings School of Global Public Health Veteran Healthy Communities Project.

VBH is dedicated to sharing resources, as demonstrated by our presentations on NCServes at both the NC State Association of Veteran Service Officers annual training and the NCWorks annual training conference.

We actively participate in community-focused initiatives such as Wake Vet S.A.F.E. – Lock, Call, Live, and contribute to local planning efforts by serving on the Wake County 2025-2030 Consolidated Housing Plan Committee, the Wake County Community Needs Assessment Committee, and engaging with the Wake County Housing Continuum of Care. Our collaborations extend to the Greater Triangle Veterans Military Families Alliance, reinforcing our commitment to comprehensive local support.


